Another important aspect of communication is active listening, which involves attentively receiving, interpreting, and responding to verbal and nonverbal cues. Active listening is crucial for understanding others, fostering empathy, and promoting effective dialogue.

7.1.2. Characteristics

Feedback helps clarify understanding, address misunderstandings, and ensure the intended message is received accurately. Constructive feedback promotes growth and continuous improvement in communication skills.
6. **Empathy:** Empathy is the ability to understand and share the feelings and perspectives of others. It plays a vital role in effective communication by fostering connection, building trust, and promoting positive relationships. Empathetic communication encourages open-mindedness and facilitates meaningful dialogue.

7.1.3. Values

7.2. Teaching approaches to communication

7.2.4. Characteristics of a communication-enhancing classroom

In summary, a communication-enhancing classroom prioritizes active engagement, critical thinking, collaboration, and the application of effective communication skills in real-world contexts. Through these characteristics, learners develop the necessary communication skills to navigate diverse interpersonal and professional interactions successfully (Sheward et al., 2022; Mishkind, 2016).

7.2.5. Assessment

Assessing communication skills in the classroom is essential for evaluating learners' progress and understanding of communication concepts. Confrontation of behaviour initiates the learning process and should be supported by meaningful feedback through direct observation (Vleuten, van den Eertwegh, Girolodi, 2019). Educators can assess the development of communication skills through the following methods:

- **Asking open-ended questions:** Instead of simply testing learners' knowledge recall, educators can ask open-ended questions that require learners to analyse, evaluate, and articulate their thoughts on communication topics. By encouraging learners to provide well-reasoned responses and support their answers with evidence, educators can assess learners' critical thinking skills and their ability to apply communication principles effectively.
- **Assigning projects and presentations:** Assigning projects and presentations allows learners to apply their communication skills to real-world situations. Educators should provide clear criteria and expectations for these assignments, assessing learners' ability to communicate effectively, organize their thoughts, and present information in a coherent and engaging manner. This assessment method also evaluates learners' creativity and fluency in communication.

- **Conducting debates and discussions:** Debates and discussions provide opportunities for learners to practice their communication skills by presenting arguments, critically evaluating evidence, and considering different perspectives. Educators can observe learners' ability to analyse and evaluate information in real-time, assess their active participation in discussions, and evaluate their ability to communicate their ideas effectively.
- **Peer assessment:** Peer assessment can be a valuable tool in assessing communication skills. By involving learners in evaluating their peers' work and providing feedback, educators promote a collaborative learning environment and provide learners with multiple perspectives on the communication process. 7.3. Good practices/applications in adult education

Inspired by the teaching style of Socrates, this method guides learners through a series of thought-provoking questions to challenge assumptions, stimulate in-depth analysis, and promote meaningful dialogue.

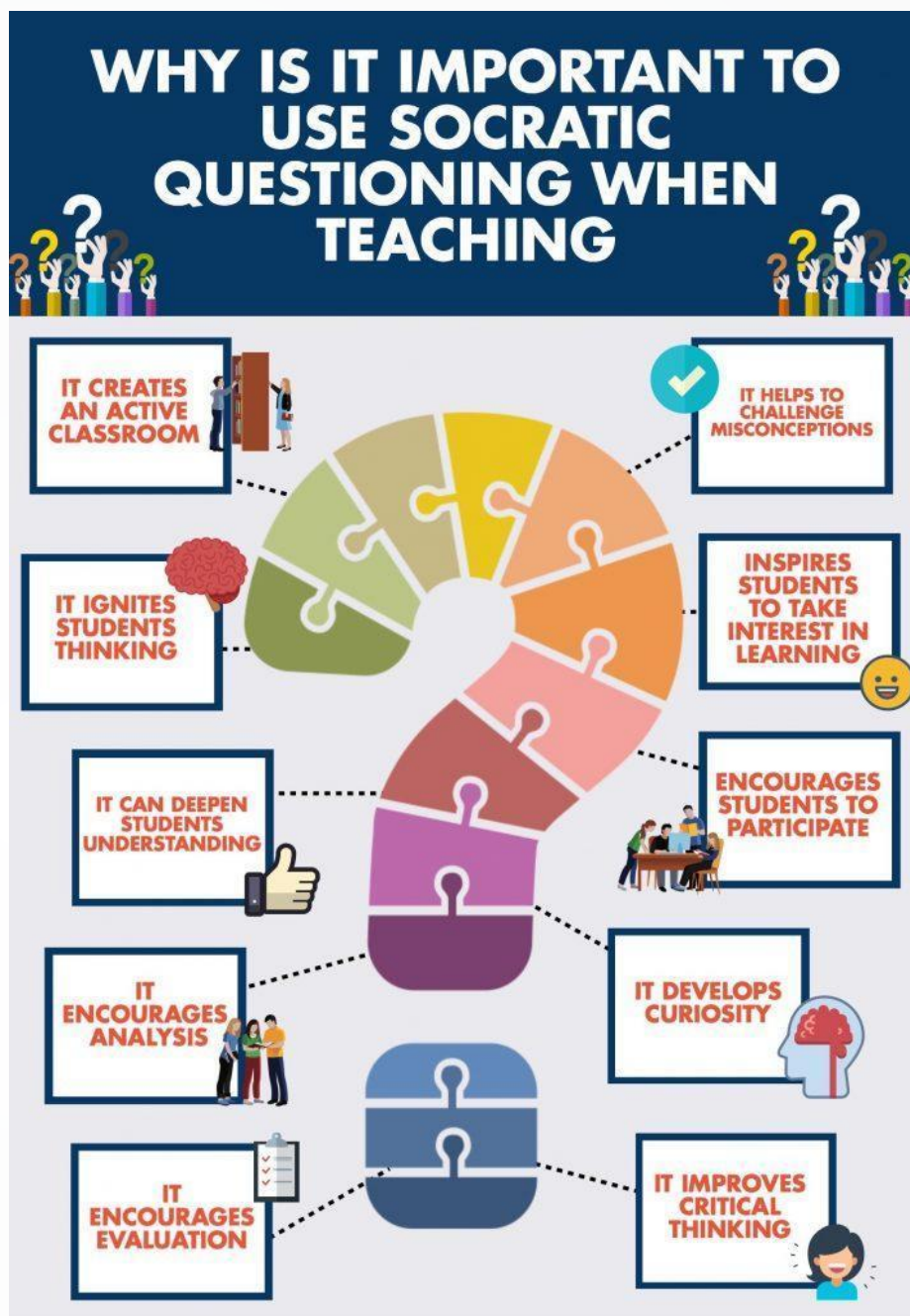
The Socratic Questioning method aims to enhance critical thinking skills by encouraging learners to examine their beliefs, explore different perspectives, and develop logical reasoning. To apply this method effectively in practice, educators can follow these steps:

- **Establish a safe learning environment:** Create a supportive and respectful classroom environment where adult learners feel comfortable expressing their ideas. Encourage open dialogue and assure learners that their contributions are valued.
- **Pose thought-provoking questions:** Ask open-ended questions that challenge assumptions, promote analysis, and stimulate critical thinking. These questions should go beyond simple factual answers and encourage learners to provide evidence, consider alternative viewpoints, and explore complex concepts.
- **Allow for reflection time:** Provide ample time for adult learners to process and reflect on the questions posed. Moments of silence allow for deep thinking and give learners the opportunity to formulate thoughtful responses.
- **Encourage discussion and dialogue:** Facilitate discussions where adult learners can communicate their ideas, respond to different perspectives, and construct evidence-

based arguments. Encourage respectful debate, question reasoning, and promote the expansion of ideas through dialogue.

- **Probe for clarity and evidence:** Use follow-up questions to probe learners for further clarification, evidence, and logical reasoning supporting their arguments. This helps learners develop effective articulation of their thoughts, critical evaluation of information, and refinement of their reasoning skills.
- **Provide feedback and guided reflection:** Offer constructive feedback on learners' responses, highlighting strengths and areas for improvement. Encourage learners to reflect on their thinking processes, evaluate the effectiveness of their arguments, and consider alternative viewpoints.
- **Connect to real-world applications:** Relate the Socratic Questioning method to real-world scenarios and applications of communication. Help adult learners see the practical relevance of critical thinking and communication skills by exploring how they can be applied in their personal lives, professional endeavors, and interactions with others.

By implementing the Socratic Questioning method as a teaching practice, educators can foster a classroom culture that values critical thinking and communication skills, empowering adult learners to engage in meaningful dialogue and develop their communication proficiency (Merriam, 2004; Katsara & De Witte, 2019).
